As with all other businesses and organizations, the Board has been experiencing the effects of inflation in all areas of operation. The Board has also experienced an increase in staffing costs as we strive to meet the needs of folks in our community and retain quality staff. This year for 2023, it's looking like our total expenses will exceed the total amount of revenue we will receive. It has been at least 17 years since this has happened. For the past three years, the Board was able to reduce the collection of our main operating levy by a ½ mill. With these increased costs and looking at our five year cash projection, the Board will begin collecting the full voted millage in 2024.

The Board continues to move forward with our strategic plan. Management has monthly meetings with MEORC to tackle the following strategic goals; develop an engaged workforce, build relationships, improve customer satisfaction, and ensure fiscal longevity. Waiver allocation and the waiting list are initiatives under fiscal longevity. Currently, the Board only has four people on the waiting list. We intend to hire new staff to assist growing the Academy for Leadership Abilities and the job coaching team. Board staff continue to refer transition children and adults to Opportunities for Ohioans with Developmental Disabilities for job coaching and job placement. We have seen an increase in referrals and have had successful job placements.

The Board has been working with Ohio Network for Innovations (ONI) on house repairs for existing homes and the purchase of an additional house. At this time, two houses are undergoing repairs and are near completion. Repairs include windows, doors, roofs, siding, flooring, ceiling, and paint. We are near purchasing a handicap accessible home. The current housing stock is four houses. These homes allow people with disabilities to live in the community with reasonable rent. The purchase and repairs are possible due to the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities capital housing funds, which cover the majority of the cost.

Direct Support Professional (DSP) Appreciation Week was September 11-17. Please take a moment to thank a DSP and share with them how much their work means to you. Carroll County Board of DD purchased gift cards for all Carroll County DSPs to express our gratitude for the work they do. Intermediate Class








HELP PROTECT YOURSELF FROM GETTING & SPREADING PINK EYE (CONJUNCTIVITIS)

PINK EYE IS OFTEN HIGHLY CONTAGIOUS.

IT CAN BE CAUSED BY

- Viruses (very contagious)
- Bacteria (very contagious)
- Allergens, like pollen (not contagious)
- Irritants, like smoke or dust (not contagious)







SEE A DOCTOR IF YOU

HAVE PINK EYE ALONG WITH ANY OF THE FOLLOWING:

SYMPTOMS USUALLY

INCLUDE:

- Redness or swelling
- Watery eyes
- A gritty feel
- Itchiness, irritation, or burning
- Discharge
- Orusting of the eyelids or eyelashes
- Eye pain
- Sensitivity to light or blurred vision.
- Intense eye redness
- Symptoms that get worse or don't improve
- A weakened immune system, for example. from HIV or cancer treatment
- Pre-existing eye conditions



Newborns with symptoms of pink eye should see a doctor right away.

A doctor can usually diagnose the cause of pink eye based on symptoms and patient history.



PROTECT YOURSELF AND OTHERS FROM PINK EYE

- Wash your hands often with soap and water, and help young children do the same. Wash hands especially well after touching someone with pink eye or their personal items.
- Avoid touching or rubbing your eyes. This can worsen the condition or spread it to your other eye.
- Avoid sharing personal items, such as makeup, eye drops, towels, bedding, contact lenses and containers, and eyeglasses.
- Do not use the same eye products for your infected and non-infected eyes.
- Stop wearing contact lenses until your eye doctor says it's okay.
- Clean, store, and replace your contact lenses as instructed by your eye doctor.
