March was Developmental Disabilities Month. Each year the Carroll County Commissioners issue a proclamation recognizing March as Developmental Disabilities month. This year's theme was "Together We Can Achieve Anything." This aligns with the Board's strategic vision to "Live, Work, Play Together." As evidenced by the relationships I have observed in the community where people work, play sports, and socialize, I am encouraged that we are making great strides towards this vision.

The Board is blessed with

this community's support and income from gas and oil. This was the first year I saw our waiting list increase to sixteen people since the waiting list assessment rule change in 2018. The Board is also serving more people. Our current funding has allowed us to address the waiting list. The Board approved increasing the Level 1 Waiver cap from forty to fifty waivers and approved an emergency Individual Options Waiver. This means we can address everyone on our waiting list with the combination of federal funding and local funds for the required match.

The Carroll County Board of Developmental Disabilities was created in 1967 by Senate Bill 169. This was in response to parents advocating for their children to get services. We take that mission very seriously and provide services for as many as possible. I know the system is complicated. I would like to take time to explain our waiting list.

In 2018, the Ohio Department of Developmental Disabilities revised the waiting list rule and developed a waiting list assessment. The process begins with a call from an individual or guardian expressing a need for services. The Board then has fifteen days to initiate and 45 days to complete a waiting list assessment. The results may show an immediate need the Board must meet within 30 days or it can identify a current need that can be met within the next twelve months with waiver funding, and they are added to the waiting list. There are also alternative funding sources that can meet a need that does not require a waiver. In short, if a need is identified the Board must address it.



The last thing I want to share is Carroll Hills Council decided this year to change the format of our annual banquet. We moved Board staff recognition to our annual in-service, allowing more time to recognize people with disabilities for their achievements. As a result, the Council added more categories for people with disabilities to be recognized including an additional personal achievement for students and adults as well as an agency provider recognizing one individual for their personal achievement. There were so many success stories this year and all the nominees and recipients are winners in our eyes!

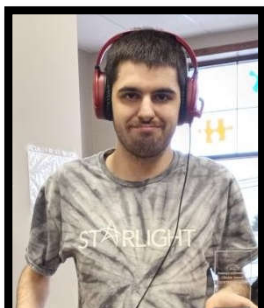
