

MENTALLY RETARDED CLASS SEEN STARTING NEXT FALL

Plans are being made for organization of a class of pupils next fall, it was announced at a meeting of the Carroll-co council for retarded children Friday evening. Needed are a teacher, room, equipment and funds to meet other expenses.

Carrollton board of education, it was stated, has made available the former vo-ag room in the old high school building.

A call has been issued for a teacher, who must meet certain qualifications for the salaried position.

Dr. Mary K. Vallwalk of the Dover Guidance center will be in Carroll-co June 18, 19 and 20 to conduct tests for mentally retarded children, the schedule to be announced at a later date. The cost to parents is \$2 per child. Dr. Vallwalk is a psychologist.

The council reports a fund of \$203.11 including \$100 from the Carrollton Junior Women's club, \$20 from Herrington - Bethel church, \$25 from Carrollton F.O.E. auxiliary, with the remainder representing proceeds from a bake sale and individual donations.

Mrs. Franklin Fuss is president of the council; Mrs. Robert Price, vice president; Mrs. Robert McClester, secretary and Mrs. Harold Wynn, treasurer.

Grant Room for Retarded Class

Carrollton Exempted Village board of education Tuesday evening granted the Carroll County Council for Retarded Children the use of a room in the old high school building for a class to instruct mentally retarded children.

Tentatively the room for the class is in the northwest corner of the basement, formerly used by the vo-ag class. The board made an agreement with officers of the council that the room will be given back to the school whenever it might be needed.

Two more resignations were accepted by the school board. They are William Curry, mechanical drawing and woodworking instructor, and Dale Gilcrest, chemistry, physics and geometry teacher.
